Re Bureau letter to Albany, dated 5/10/68.

The Bureau will note in Jacksonville letter to the Bureau, 3/12/68, captioned "The New Left - Road to Anarchy" that every effort is being made to ascertain if any activities connected therewith exist in the Jacksonville Division.

To date, no New Left movement or its key activists have been identified in the Jacksonville Division.

During the past several weeks there has been considerable controversy on the campus of Florida State University, Tallahassee, Florida, for the refusal of the president to permit a publication of an article in the campus newspaper, containing vulgar language. A small group of students backed by some members of the faculty, demonstrated. As a result of this controversy the president submitted his resignation which was not accepted by the Board of Regents.

This incident received considerable publicity in the press and other news media, most of which was favorable to the stand taken by the president of the Florida State University.

There are recent demands by students at Florida A & M University, Tallahassee, Florida, for more movement in decisions and policy making.

At the University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida, student unrest has existed over such things as student housing, student publications, the student code of conduct, racial relations, ROTC and the like.

The president of the University of Florida has recommended the representatives of students, faculty and administration meet to attempt to solve these problems.

The above shows briefly that there is some element of unrest or controversy on the university campuses in Gainesville and Tallahassee, Florida, but such incidents cannot be defined as the New Left movement. Therefore, no recommendations are being submitted for potential counterintelligence action against the New Left movement in the Jacksonville Division.

SA personnel of this office are alert for any New Left movement and in the event such are identified in the future, consideration will be given relative to proposed counterintelligence action.

(1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

The "Gainesville Sun," daily newspaper, Gainesville, Florida, in its issue dated 12/12/67 carried an article captioned "Police Activities Due Grand Jury Inquiry." The article states that the Alachua County Grand Jury will convene on 12/18/67 to investigate charges of criminal activity in the Gainesville Police Department.

[REDACTED], Negro male, on [REDACTED] accused police officers of engaging in sexual relations with a Negro woman prisoner and of propositioning other Negro women in the jail.

[REDACTED] claims to be a representative of the "Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee" (SNCC).

[REDACTED] and [REDACTED], white female, co-authored and distributed a mimeograph leaflet on [REDACTED] entitled [REDACTED] which accused the Grand Jury, among other things, as being as racist and klan infested as the police department.

On [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were cited for contempt of Grand Jury. On [REDACTED] was sentenced to six months in the county jail and THOMAS was sentenced to four months. Their cases are under appeal.

On 1/4/68 the Alachua County Grand Jury reported it found no creditable evidence that jailors or other police employees ever conducted themselves improperly toward female inmates in the city jail.

(2) Immorality

[REDACTED], referred to above, has been closely associated with the Negro element in Gainesville, Florida, and particularly with [REDACTED]. She has been paying rent on the residence of [REDACTED] which is also used as the headquarters for SNCC in Gainesville, Florida.

(3) Action by College Administrators

[REDACTED], advised on 5/9/68 that the administration of Florida State University, Tallahassee, refused authority to publish a story containing a number of four letter words in the "Legend," a campus magazine.

As the result, about 250 students and a few faculty members met in protest.

A vigil was maintained in front of the Administration Building of the University consisting of from 10 to 150 students from 5/9/68 until 5/16/68.

Demands were presented to the administration of the University which included prompt publication of the story in the "Legend," public apologies to the editor and student body, firing of the Student Publication Advisor, and the change of rules by the administration to allow the publication of any article which does not violate the law.

On 5/27/68 a statement by the President of Florida State University was read at a meeting of about 300 students. The statement indicated that the President accepted in full two recommendations of a special student - faculty committee, which had been created after the demonstration began. These recommendations were for a permanent change in rules at Florida State University which would enlarge the Official Board of Student Publications, which reviews all campus publications, to make a majority of the board students. In general the new recommendations would give students much more control over approval of student publications.

The demonstration was initially led by the editor of "The Legend" and sympathetic students, including members of the Young Liberals. The demonstrators called themselves the "Grassroots Movement" and a large segment of the Florida State University student body and a number of faculty members either participated with the demonstrators or were sympathetic to it.

Principal leader of the demonstration was Lymen Fletcher, President of the student body; the Student Senate and many members of the student government backed the action.

*CP, FLORIDA STATE UNIVERSITY, TALLAHASSEE, FLA.*  
At a mass meeting held on May 27, 1966, an announcement from the President of the University was read which acquiesced the students demands regarding more student participation in review and approval of publications. The announcement, however, refused to allow publication of the article in question under university auspices.

The demonstration was discontinued by majority vote of the students.

The article was later published, as originally written in "The Legend" under the sponsorship of the student government but not the Florida State University.

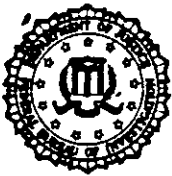

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 12, 1968, that Florida State University, Tallahassee, Florida, had an enrollment of 15,500 students during the spring quarter of 1968. Most of the student activists at this University have been members of the Young Liberals Organization, which is a local, independent, campus approved student organization, with faculty sponsor. In recent years it has been loosely organized and has a small, constantly changing membership.

This group has the stated goal of promoting projects to improve "liberal" values and the members have been involved in promoting civil rights, student rights, peace and an opposition to the war in Vietnam. It is considered to be a vehicle, outlet, more or less in the form of a discussion group.

While the Young Liberals may be considered a part of the New Left, it is not as clearly defined as some of the national campus organizations.

A second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, on June 12, 1968, corroborated the above information furnished by the first source.

A third source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 25, 1968, that the principal leaders of the Young Liberals during the spring of 1968 were [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] also known as [REDACTED]

The first and second sources, referred to above, advised that the Young Liberals was the principal group sponsoring a peaceful anti-Vietnam war demonstration at Florida State University, held on the occasion of a speech given by Vice President Hubert Humphry on the campus on March 1, 1968.

A total of about 150 students and a few faculty members stood or walked in front of the Administration Building where Mr. Humphrey was speaking. The group dispersed shortly after Mr. Humphrey left the building.

Some of the individuals carried signs protesting the war in Vietnam. There was no heckling, disorder or interference with the Vice President's speech or visit to the campus.

The first and second sources advised that a peaceful, "anti-censorship" demonstration and vigil were conducted by Florida State University students in front of the campus Administration Building, periodically, from May 9, 1968, to May 27, 1968.

The students demonstrated in protest at the refusal of Florida State University President to approve for campus publication an article in the Florida State University literary magazine "The Legend," which contained what he believed to be vulgar and obscene language.

The article had been approved by the Florida State University Board of Student Publications, but the president, as the final authority, order the offensive words removed from the article.

The University of Florida, located in Gainesville, Florida, is a state university system with an enrollment of approximately 19,000 students, and an anticipated enrollment in the Fall of 1968 of over 20,000.

On June 26, 1968, Source 1, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the main Student Left Organization at the University of Florida, Gainesville, is the Students For Democratic Society/  
Southern Student Organizing Committee (SDS/SSOC), which members during the past year have also composed the membership of the Student Peace Union (SPU) and the Student Committee on Academic Freedom (SCAF), both campus organizations. *CAMPUS ORGANIZATIONS*

Source 1 advised SPU and SCAF are primarily inactive and their name is used only if a particular occasion calls for their name as being more fitting for a given issue. Source 1 cited as an example the SPU protest against compulsory ROTC and the SCAF supporting Dr. Marshall B. Jones, Professor of Psychology and Psychiatry, in his fight against being denied tenure.

AT UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA

The SSOC Chapter, Gainesville, in October, 1967, in a news release described Dr. Marshall B. Jones as a member of the National Advisory Board of *FLA.*

A characterization of SDS and SSOC are attached to this memorandum.

Source 1 advised that [REDACTED] was  
the main faculty supporter of the SDS/SSOC and was  
also a financial contributor to this organization.  
Source 1 further advised that [REDACTED] is leaving the  
University of Florida and the fact that [REDACTED] has  
left Gainesville and the SDS/SSOC is left without  
leadership of any magnitude.

[REDACTED] is expected to finish  
his graduate work at the University of Florida at the  
conclusion of the winter quarter and is not expected  
to return until fall of 1968, thereby leaving only  
[REDACTED] of the leaders who will be returning.  
[REDACTED] is scheduled to graduate at the conclusion of  
the Fall Quarter, 1968.

Source 1 advised the most disruptive activities  
of the SDS/SSOC on the campus during the year were  
demonstrations against the Dow Chemical Corporation  
recruiting on the campus of the University of Florida  
in February, 1968, and again in April, 1968. The recruiters  
for Dow Chemical Corporation spent two days on campus  
in February, and on the first day there were eleven  
individuals arrested on charges of trespassing as a  
result of their blocking the entrance to the placement  
office of the University of Florida. Only five of these  
individuals were students at the University of Florida.

Source 1 advised that this group also  
demonstrated against the Central Intelligence Agency and  
military recruitment on the campus at the University of  
Florida during January and February, 1968.

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Source 1 advised that the group has also demonstrated against compulsory ROTC at the University but their demonstrations attracted very little attention or support.

Source 1 advised that a group has also attacked the policies of the administration, requesting the removal or the resignation of [REDACTED], and has also protested compulsory on-campus residence for freshmen and sophomores.

The group has regularly demanded more authority by students and faculty in the operation of the University and less control exerted by the administration.

Source 1 advised that more than likely ROTC will be made voluntary at the University of Florida in 1968, and that this move should take some of the "steam" out of any ROTC issue that may arise in the Fall of 1968.

Source 1 advised that with most of the current leaders of the SIS/ISOC leaving it is difficult at this time to make a prognosis as to what may be in store for the University during the coming fall.

On June 28, 1968, Source 2, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that on June 26, 1968, that President Stephen O'Connell, University of Florida, has organized an Action Committee consisting of 75 individuals, which number consists of 25 faculty members, 25 students and 25 staff members. The purpose of this Action Committee is to hear grievances, to bring about logical changes for students in the University, and should be an effective move on the part of the administration to possibly forestall any serious demonstrations during the coming Fall quarter.

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Source 2 advised that the Action Committee has been broken down into numerous task forces consisting of representatives from the Committee to analyze and evaluate student demands for changes, and to come to some logical remedy.

On June 2, 1968, Source 3, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that [redacted] also known as [redacted] a graduate student in education at the University of Florida, claims he is going to take over the organization of "white radicals" at the University of Florida. Fine claims that there are over twenty "white radicals" but some are graduating, and there are only about ten left at the present time.

Source 4, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on May 15, 1968, that [redacted] is a braggart and a "big talker," particularly in discussions regarding revolutions. In his opinion, [redacted] is a Communist; and he bases his opinion on "revolutionary statements" he has heard [redacted] make, as well as [redacted] adherence to the Communist philosophy.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left," which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

APPENDIX

SOUTHERN STUDENT ORGANIZING COMMITTEE (SSOC)

On November 1, 1966, a first source advised that the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) with headquarters at 1708 Portland Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee, was formed on the weekend of April 3-5, 1964, to stimulate activity of Southern student groups in areas of civil rights, peace, academic freedom, civil liberties, capital punishment and unemployment. Originally, it was to be a white counterpart of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC). It has agreed to work with similar interested groups such as SNCC and Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), and Southern Conference Educational Fund, Inc. (SCEF). SSOC is a fraternal affiliate of SDS.

Beginning in the Fall of 1966, SSOC became a membership organization and embarked on a campaign to form local chapters on various college campuses throughout the South. SSOC publishes, October through May each year, a publication, "New South Student", which according to the above source has increasingly espoused and defended the pro-Communist and anti-United States position on domestic and foreign policy.

On September 27, 1966, a second source advised that [redacted] of Nashville, Tennessee, while in attendance at a Communist Party, USA (CPUSA) Youth Conference, Camp Westluck, New York, [redacted] gave a report regarding Nashville, saying that CP personnel were concentrating on organizing rent strikes, working with SSOC and SCEF and establishing a Socialist Study Group for students. He predicted future rioting, which, he said, the CP must take advantage of. He emphasized that more CP youth must be sent South.

On August 12, 1966, a third source advised that [redacted] had been in the CP about four months.

SOUTHERN STUDENT LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE (SSOC)

On September 21, 1966, and again on June 2, 1967, the second source advised that during the Summer of 1966, the CPUSA concentrated its youth cadre in organizing projects in several cities in an effort to recruit for and strengthen local CP youth organizations. Nashville, Tennessee, was included in this project. The youth plan in charge of the Nashville project was [REDACTED], with funds to be made available for [REDACTED] full-time organizers in Nashville. [REDACTED] also known as [REDACTED] of the CP in New York, New York, Queens College [REDACTED], came to Nashville in the Summer of 1966 for this purpose. At the CPUSA Youth Conference held at Camp Abolard, New York, liaison had been made with SSOC that contact had also been made with black militants on Nashville college campuses; and that a [REDACTED] had been made toward organizing in the Nashville Negro community. He said he thought a riot was possible in the near future in the Negro community and the CP must take advantage of same. He emphasized that some main efforts were to work with SSOC and SCEF. Following the conference, attendees [REDACTED]

February 28, 1967, a fourth source advised that [REDACTED] of Seattle, Washington, a member of the Northeast CP District, had gone to Nashville, Tennessee, to organize in connection with a CP assignment.

On June 8, 1967, source five advised that [REDACTED] and wife [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are all [REDACTED] of SSOC in Nashville and that [REDACTED] is now editor of the official SSOC publication "New South Student".

On July 7, 1967, source six advised that [REDACTED] and wife [REDACTED] attended a CPUSA Youth Conference at Camp Abolard, New York, July 1 through 4, 1967.

SOUTHERN STUDENT ORGANIZING COMMITTEE (SSOC)

The masthead of the June, 1967, issue of "Southern Patriot", official publication of SCEF, lists [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] as Editors and lists [REDACTED] Executive Director.

The "Nashville Banner," Nashville, Tennessee, newspaper issue of May 5, 1967, reported that SSOC was preparing for the May 17, 1967, appearance of [REDACTED] at Vanderbilt University. [REDACTED] on May 12, 1967, brought to the "Banner" office publicity material which the CP had sent to SSOC.

The April, 1967, issue, Volume IV, No. 4, of "New South Student", published each month, October through May, by SSOC, carried an article on page 22 entitled "American Labor", by [REDACTED] a review of a book entitled "The CIA and American Labor", authored by [REDACTED] Labor Editor of "The Worker", east coast Communist newspaper. [REDACTED] is described therein as an active member of the Nashville SSOC Chapter.

A source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 12, 1968, that Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University, commonly known as Florida A&M University, is located in Tallahassee, Florida. The student body of approximately 3,800 students and faculty are predominantly of the Negro race.

The above source and another source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised on June 20, 1968, that there are no organizations on the campus of Florida A&M University definitely defined as the New Left, although there was considerable disturbance at or near the University on April 4, 1968, following the death of Dr. Martin Luther King.

[REDACTED] advised on June 11, 1968, that prior to the incidents which occurred on the night of April 4, 1968, [REDACTED] made inflammatory statements on the campus which may have influenced other students to participate in the disturbances that followed.

Hundreds of students milled around on or near the campus and during the night rocks were thrown at cars driven by persons of the white race on streets adjoining the campus.

Incendiary devices, consisting of bottles filled with kerosene or gasoline, were thrown at mobile homes and wooden buildings near the campus. Several of these structures were completely destroyed by fire.

During the night, shots were fired from the vicinity of the campus at police who had set up road blocks to stop traffic from passing near the campus.

A white youth was burned to death in a fire of incendiary nature which burned a store building in which he was sleeping.

Because of the high state of tension, Florida A&M authorities closed the University for one week. There were no further incidents after the students returned to classes.

Eleven individuals, mostly Florida A&M students, were arrested by the Tallahassee, Florida, Police Department for involvement in the incidents dealing with the disturbances. These cases have not come to trial as yet.

saying that he, [REDACTED], could make some good money. [REDACTED] claims he refused and told [REDACTED] he wanted nothing to do with it. [REDACTED] made no further comments to [REDACTED] about growing marijuana.

The marijuana weed was described to [REDACTED] and he was requested to look around his property to see if he could find any marijuana growing.

On 7/17/68, [REDACTED] advised that on the afternoon of 7/15/68, his married daughter happened to look out the window of their home and observed [REDACTED] pulling what appeared to be a weed out of the ground approximately fifty yards in front of their house along side a fence and walked back in the direction of his, [REDACTED] s, residence. [REDACTED] advised that when his daughter informed him of this act on [REDACTED] part, he searched the area where [REDACTED] was seen and discovered several stalks of what he believed to be marijuana. [REDACTED] removed a couple of stem leaves and made them available for purpose of having the leaves analyzed.

On 7/18/68 the leaves made available by [REDACTED] were shown to several state investigators specializing in narcotic investigations who are having a meeting at Gainesville, Florida, and they all concurred that the leaves were marijuana.

On 7/18/68, this matter was discussed with Captain [REDACTED], Chief Criminal Investigator, Alachua County Sheriff's Office, and on the same date SA [REDACTED], accompanied by Captain [REDACTED] with [REDACTED] permission, searched the area where he had discovered the marijuana weed. Captain [REDACTED] counted twelve stalks of marijuana growing in this particular location which is approximately two hundred or more feet from [REDACTED] residence and according to [REDACTED] is not considered part of [REDACTED] rental property. Captain [REDACTED] removed the sufficient number of leaves and advised he would have these leaves delivered to the Department of Health, Jacksonville, Florida, for a positive analysis to determine if the weed is actually marijuana.

Captain [REDACTED] discussed this matter with Mr. [REDACTED] who advised that based upon FINE's previous

conversation with [REDACTED] regarding the growing of marijuana on the property and the fact that [REDACTED] daughter had observed [REDACTED] remove a weed from the spot where the marijuana was growing he would consider this to be sufficient probable cause for a search warrant to be drawn up for the purpose of searching [REDACTED] immediate residence. Mr. [REDACTED] said the growing and possession of marijuana is a felony in the State of Florida.

This matter was immediately furnished to the Sheriff's Office in view of the fact that [REDACTED] has previously advised [REDACTED] contemplates moving into Gainesville, Florida, within the next two weeks and therefore time is of the essence in order that his residence on the property where the marijuana is being grown may be searched should a search warrant be issued.

This matter will be closely followed with the Alachua County Sheriff's Office and the Bureau will be immediately advised of all pertinent results.
