

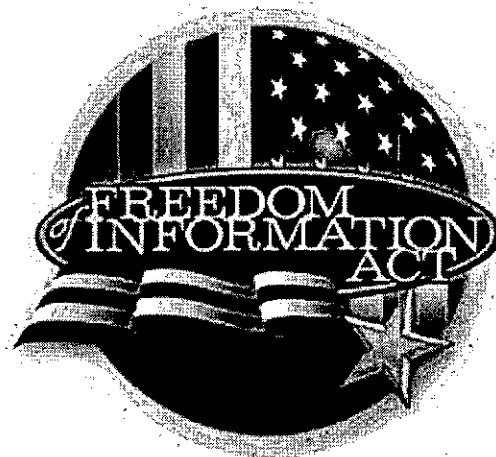

[REDACTED] furnished the following information on 1/29/69 which eventually resulted in the arrest of two members of the Little Rock Chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC), which organization is now using the front name of Arkansas Peace Information Center (APIC).

The prisoners who were staying in the cell with [REDACTED] have several saws concealed in the cell and have sawed through all but two of the bars in the cell leading to the outside window of their cell. They also have cut a hole in the mesh screen covering the window and haul material from the outside through this hole by lowering a rope. These prisoners have requested members of the Little Rock SSOC (APIC) who have visited [REDACTED] in his cell to bring them additional saws since they claim their saws are almost worn out. Several APIC members have indicated they may do this.

The above information was furnished on 1/29/69 to [REDACTED] Little Rock. [REDACTED] subsequently advised that he had pulled a bed check in this cell and had found some saws and had also found that all of the bars in the cell but two had been sawed through. [REDACTED] stated that the bars have now been soldered. [REDACTED] stated that the information furnished had definitely averted a planned jail break. He also advised he had instructed deputies to remain alert for any individuals outside for the next several nights at the jail.

The Arkansas Gazette, Little Rock, Ark., daily newspaper, carried an article in the Saturday, 2/1/69, edition reporting that two individuals, one of whom gave an address of the APIC, were arrested by officers of the Pulaski County SO on the night of 1/31/69 outside the jail near a rope that was hanging from an inside cell. These individuals were charged with vagrancy according to news reports. This article identified those two as DARLENE TAYLOR, aged 21, 1609 South Park, Little Rock, and PRESTON DAVIS, aged 18, 3317 West Markham.

The above is being considered tangible results under captioned program by the Little Rock Office since information furnished by Little Rock informant resulted in the arrest by the Pulaski County SO of two Little Rock SSOC members.

On 1/24/69 the above facts were discussed with USA W. H. DILLAHUNTY, EDA, Little Rock, who advised that he saw no circumstances at this time which would preclude SA [REDACTED] from testifying in court and he would make available one of his assistants at the court in the event the defense counsel or judge directed SA [REDACTED] to answer questions not within his authority.

SA [REDACTED] is currently assigned to the Little Rock Division and will testify in local court UACB.

The following is being furnished to the Bureau to set forth tangible results in connection with captioned matter.

[redacted] advised, on 7/8/68 that [redacted] Little Rock, Ark., coordinator of the Little Rock chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) [redacted]

[redacted] and it was general knowledge among her friends that she used and sold marijuana at her residence and that she keeps it in her bedroom. Informant stated that [redacted] (the organizer of an anti-Vietnam demonstration in Little Rock, 4/3/68, and a student at Columbia University, New York) brought an unknown quantity of LSD and marijuana to Little Rock during the first week in July and [redacted] has the LSD in his residence and has delivered the marijuana to [redacted] residence.

On 7/8/68 the above information was paraphrased and furnished to [redacted], Little Rock, Ark. Subsequently a search warrant was obtained by the Little Rock [redacted] based on an affidavit sworn out by an Agent of the Little Rock Office detailing this informant's information.

On 7/10/68 [redacted] Little Rock [redacted] advised that at approximately 11:00 P. M., 7/9/68, officers of the Little Rock PD arrested the following individuals at the residence of [redacted], Little Rock, and charged them with possession of marijuana:

These arrests were made as a result of a surveillance by the Little Rock PD and a search warrant obtained mentioned above. At the time of the search of the [REDACTED] residence the Little Rock PD found 44 ounces of marijuana. [REDACTED] subsequently furnished a consent to search to the Little Rock PD and 1 additional ounce of marijuana was found at his home. [REDACTED] subsequently admitted bringing the marijuana to Arkansas from New York.

[REDACTED] advised that the Arkansas Statutes provide that anyone in possession of marijuana must pay a \$100 tax per ounce, and in view of the above information, he stated that each of the individuals found in the [REDACTED] apartment would have to pay \$4,400 taxes, and [REDACTED] would have to pay an additional \$100 taxes on the ounce found in his home, making a total of \$4,500 taxes for [REDACTED].

[REDACTED] also advised that to the best of his knowledge this was the largest amount of marijuana ever recovered by local officers in the State of Arkansas. All of the above cases are currently pending in local court in Little Rock. Of the individuals arrested, [REDACTED], and [REDACTED] are all members of the Little Rock Chapter of the SSOC and [REDACTED] is the principal officer of the Little Rock Chapter of SSOC.

As stated above, this is considered to be tangible results under captioned program and this matter has additional potential for disruption of this New Left organization in the future. No specific counterintelligence action is being recommended at this time; however, this matter will be given serious consideration and specific recommendations made to the Bureau when the fall semester begins at Little Rock University and it is determined how many of the above individuals continue to affiliate with SSOC.

The Bureau was advised in Little Rock letter of 9/18/68 that this matter possibly had a potential for further counterintelligence action if any of those individuals arrested with [REDACTED] for possession of marijuana continued to associate with the LR SSOC. This is to advise the Bureau that due to the present make-up of the LR SSOC, it is not felt the arrest of these individuals presents any opportunity for further counterintelligence action against the LR SSOC.

Reairtel requests authority to make an anonymous mailing to the parents of [redacted] who was described as having been involved in anti-Vietnam war demonstrations and as having attended meetings of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC).

Authority to make such a mailing is denied. It does not appear, from information contained in reairtel, that your office has conducted sufficient investigation of [redacted] to establish her relationship with the New Left. The mere fact that she has demonstrated against the war and has attended SSOC meetings does not sufficiently establish her sympathy for the New Left to consider counterintelligence action at this time.

If you develop information at a later date that shows her to be a leader in a New Left organization, you should at that time consider appropriate counterintelligence action. Take no such action, however, without prior Bureau authority.

NOTE: By reairtel, Little Rock advised that [redacted] had previously been involved in anti-Vietnam type demonstrations and had attended SSOC meetings. After being away from home several months, she returned with an individual who gave his name as [redacted] and with whom she is currently living as husband and wife at her parents' home. LR advised an informant has stated [redacted] has openly bragged that she is not married to [redacted]. It suggested an anonymous letter be mailed to her parents bringing out the fact that she was not married. While this proposal might be effective, it is not felt her New Left leanings have been sufficiently established.

For the information of the Bureau, [redacted] has previously been involved in anti-Vietnam type demonstrations in the Little Rock Division and she has been absent from the Little Rock area for the past several months. [redacted] recently returned to the Little Rock area with an individual who is giving his name as [redacted]. The correct identity of this individual is not known since he has already given several other aliases to [redacted] these being [redacted] and [redacted] has advised that [redacted] and [redacted] have attended several recent meetings of the Little Rock Chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) since returning to Little Rock and have openly bragged about the fact that they are not married and have told [redacted] parents that they are married and they are currently living at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. [redacted] Little Rock. [redacted] advised that a sufficient number of persons are aware of this deception on the part of these individuals that it would not jeopardize his position in any way should any action be taken with this information.

This, of course, will be sent on plain, unwatermarked bond paper and will be typed on a manual typewriter to eliminate any professional appearance in the preparation of the letter.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED]

I very regretfully sit down and write this letter to you since I have always made it a practice never to interfere in the lives of others, but I feel that I would not be fulfilling my obligation to you as a friend if I did not bring this information to your attention.

I am sure that you have long been aware that your daughter [REDACTED] has been running around with a group of "beatniks," many of whom have been arrested for possession of marijuana and for involvement in illicit drug traffic. I felt this was none of my business and it was so well known by everyone that you were probably doing the best you could with an uncontrollable child.

It has come to my attention that your daughter [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are living at your home and have told you they are married and, yet, have been going around Little Rock openly bragging about the fact that they are not married and are lying to you about the fact that they are. I feel that you would want to know about this sinful and immoral behavior on their part and so I am writing this letter to bring it to your attention. I do this as a concerned parent who also has teenage children and one who is fully aware of the many difficulties that can arise in trying to properly bring up these children. Please understand that there is no animosity involved in the writing of this letter but merely an attempt to insure that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are not allowed to "pull the wool over your eyes" any longer.

1. Potential Counterintelligence Action

The arrest of certain members of the Little Rock Chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) on possession of marijuana by the Little Rock, Ark., PD on 7/9/68 (full details of which were furnished to the Bureau in Little Rock letter dated 8/20/68) possibly contains potential for disruption of this New Left organization in the future; however, no specific recommendations are being made in this regard at this time since the chapter has been inactive since these arrests and plans to reactivate after school opens in September, 1968. Consideration will be given after the chapter reactivates and a determination is made as to whether any of the individuals arrested continue activity in this chapter as to whether these arrests can be utilized in the form of counterintelligence action. It appears doubtful at this time as to whether this potential continues to exist since [redacted] the coordinator of this chapter and the person at whose house the arrests were made, has recently moved from Little Rock to Hot Springs, Ark., and reportedly will no longer be associated with the Little Rock chapter of SSOC. This matter will be closely followed and should the potential for counterintelligence action present itself, specific recommendations will be made to the Bureau prior to any action being taken.

No specific counterintelligence action is being recommended at this time; however, this matter will be given serious consideration and specific recommendations made to the Bureau when the fall semester begins at Little Rock University and it is determined how many of the above individuals continue to affiliate with SSOC.

Enclosed to the Bureau are 15 copies each of LHM's captioned "NEW LEFT ACTIVITY, LITTLE ROCK UNIVERSITY, LITTLE ROCK, ARKANSAS" and "NEW LEFT ACTIVITY, UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS, FAYETTEVILLE, ARKANSAS," which are being submitted in accordance with Buinstructions set forth in relet.

The enclosed LHM's constitute all of the "New Left activity" in the Little Rock Division. No local dissemination has been made of these LHM's.

In order to set forth the requested information under the format prescribed by the Bureau in relet, no attempt has been made to attribute the information set forth to specific sources; however, all of the information contained in these LHM's is properly documented in the Little Rock files.

As noted in the LHM's, the only "New Left activity" in Arkansas consists of SSOC chapters at Little Rock University, Little Rock, Ark., and the University of Arkansas Fayetteville, Ark. The Little Rock Office has member informant coverage in both of these chapters, specifically in the [redacted] and [redacted]

in the [redacted] in addition to these member informants, there are previously-developed established sources at both Little Rock University and the University of Arkansas who are well aware of the Bureau's interest and responsibilities in this field and these sources can and have volunteered information concerning this activity to the Little Rock Office. It is felt that the present coverage of these two chapters is adequate at this time.

The only New Left organization at Little Rock University (LRU), Little Rock, Arkansas, is a chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC), which was formed on April 21, 1968, at Little Rock. As of June 21, 1968, this SSOC chapter had approximately fifteen members and was holding weekly meetings at the residence of [redacted] coordinator of the chapter, [redacted] Little Rock.

Characterizations of the SSOC in Arkansas and the SSOC are contained in the appendix hereto.

The officers of the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC are [redacted] coordinator, and [redacted] contact and representative man. [redacted] and [redacted] were the individuals who originally formed this chapter. Set forth hereinafter is background information concerning these individuals.

[redacted] is a white male born [redacted] at [redacted]. He is currently enrolled as a student at [redacted], having been admitted on September 2, 1964, after graduating from [redacted] High School in 1964. [redacted] is single and is currently classified 2S with the Selective Service System. [redacted] resides at [redacted] in Little Rock with his parents. [redacted] attended a conference on the draft sponsored by the Arkansas Peace Information Center at Little Rock January 26-28, 1968. [redacted] participated in an anti-Vietnam demonstration held on April 3, 1968, in front of the Armed Forces Entrance and Examining Center at Little Rock held in connection with "National Resistance Day." Since the formation of the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC, [redacted] has attended weekly meetings of the chapter and [redacted] also attended the

National Executive Committee meeting of the SSOC held at Mt. Beulah Center, Edwards, Mississippi, June 22-23, 1968. To date, [REDACTED] has not indicated any sympathy for the militant activities which have occurred on college campuses in other parts of the country and has never indicated that he has any plans to encourage the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC in such a direction. [REDACTED] is primarily interested in the Vietnam War and has indicated that all of his actions will be in a legal and peaceful manner.

[REDACTED] is a white female born [REDACTED] at [REDACTED]. She graduated from [REDACTED] High School in [REDACTED] enrolled at LRU on September 9, 1965, and is currently enrolled as a student at LRU. Since the formation of the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC, weekly meetings of the chapter have been held at [REDACTED] residence, [REDACTED], Little Rock. [REDACTED] participated in an anti-Vietnam demonstration held on April 3, 1968, in front of the Armed Forces Entrance and Examining Center, Little Rock, in connection with "National Resistance Day." [REDACTED] is reportedly selling marijuana from her residence, [REDACTED] Little Rock. [REDACTED] has never indicated any sympathy or support for the militant activities of students which have occurred on college campuses in other parts of the country and she has not indicated she has any plans or desires to encourage the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC in such a direction. [REDACTED] is primarily interested in civil rights activities and has indicated that all of her activity will be legal in manner and peaceful.

The Little Rock chapter of the SSOC has not been engaged in any disruptive activities during the past year and there have been no disruptive activities which have occurred on the campus of LRU.

[REDACTED] advised a Special Agent of the FBI on February 5, 1968, that he is the state organizer for the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) with headquarters in Nashville, Tennessee. [REDACTED] advised that the first meeting of the SSOC chapter being formed on the University of Arkansas campus, Fayetteville, was to be held February 5, 1968, at the Presbyterian Church Center.

The Arkansas Traveler, the official student newspaper of the University of Arkansas, carried an article on page 1 in the issue dated February 28, 1968, captioned "Student Senate Votes Recognition to SSOC Chapter." This article reported that the University of Arkansas Student Senate voted on the night of February 27, 1968, and granted recognition to the SSOC after hearing reports from the representative of the organization. The vote was 18 to 5. This article identifies [REDACTED] as the SSOC secretary and spokesman.

A first source furnished the following information on February 12, 1968:

[REDACTED] has told him that the SSOC chapter plans to attempt to get more Negro and white people registered to vote and they plan to do some draft counseling; however, [REDACTED] did not elaborate as to what steps the SSOC planned to take in this direction.

[REDACTED] also told him that any activities of the SSOC would not interfere with the orderly operation of the University and no type of militant action would be permitted.

A second source advised on May 7, 1968, that as of that date the SSOC chapter at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, had approximately thirty members who were holding weekly meetings at the Deep End Coffee Shop, Presbyterian Center. This chapter was an affiliate of the national SSOC organization with headquarters in Nashville, Tennessee. The officers of the chapter were [REDACTED] chairman; [REDACTED] secretary; and [REDACTED] chapter representative to national meeting. All

of these officers are students at the University of Arkansas. Source also advised that [REDACTED] formerly state organizer for the SSOC, has been ordered to active duty by the U. S. Navy and reportedly has fled to Canada.

A third source furnished the following information on April 22, 1968:

An organizational meeting of the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC was held on April 21, 1968, at Little Rock, Arkansas. There were eight persons in attendance at this meeting. [REDACTED] was elected Little Rock Coordinator and [REDACTED] was elected as Little Rock University (LRU) Campus Coordinator. It was decided to call the chapter "LR SSOC" chapter. It was decided that the chapter would accept the four objectives of the national SSOC organization, they being campus reform, labor, the war, and the draft. It was decided the next meeting would be held at [REDACTED] house at [REDACTED], Little Rock, Arkansas. It was decided that, although the group would be oriented to the LRU campus, it would be open to all residents of Little Rock and it would not be necessary to be a student at LRU to join.

This third source advised on April 26, 1968, that [REDACTED] had announced on April 25, 1968, that he was resigning as Coordinator of the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC and that [REDACTED] would assume responsibilities as Little Rock Coordinator. [REDACTED] is still the contact and representative man for the Little Rock chapter of the SSOC.

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Beginning in the fall of 1966, SSOC became a membership organization and embarked on a campaign to form local chapters on various college campuses throughout the South. SSOC publishes, October through May each year, a publication, "New South Student," which, according to the above source, has increasingly espoused and defended the pro-Communist and anti-United States position on domestic and foreign policy.

included in this project. The youth placed in charge of the Nashville project was [redacted] with funds to be made available for three to five full-time organizers in Nashville. [redacted] also known as [redacted] of the CP in New York, New York, a Queens College student, came to Nashville in the summer of 1966 for this purpose. At the CPUSA Youth Conference held at Camp Webatuck, New York, September 12, 13, and 14, 1966, [redacted] reported that effective liaison had been made with SSOC; that contact had also been made with black militants on Nashville Negro college campuses; and that a beginning had been made toward organizing in the Nashville Negro community. He said he thought a riot was possible in the near future in the Negro community and the CP must take advantage of same. He emphasized that some main efforts were to work with SSOC and SCEF. Following the conference, attendees [redacted] and [redacted] also known as [redacted] traveled to Nashville to join [redacted] organizing efforts there.

On February 23, 1967, a fourth source advised that [redacted] of [redacted] a member of the Northwest CP District, had gone to Nashville, Tennessee, to organize in connection with a CP assignment.

On June 8, 1967, source five advised that [redacted] and wife [redacted] are all active members of SSOC in Nashville and that [redacted] is now editor of the official SSOC publication, "New South Student."

On July 7, 1967, source six advised that [redacted] and wife [redacted] attended a CPUSA Youth Conference at Camp Abelard, New York, July 1 through 4, 1967.

The masthead of the June 1967 issue of "Southern Patriot," official publication of SCEF, lists [redacted] and [redacted] as Editors and lists [redacted] as Executive Director.

The "Nashville Banner," Nashville, Tennessee, newspaper issue of May 5, 1967, reported that SSOC was preparing for the May 17, 1967, appearance of [redacted] National Youth Director, CPUSA, at Vanderbilt University; that [redacted] Press Agent for SSOC, on May 12, 1967, brought to the "Banner" office publicity material which the CP had sent to SSOC.

The April 1967 issue, Volume IV, No. 4, of "New South Student," published each month, October through May, by SSOC, carried an article on page 22 entitled, "CIA American Labor," by Donald Boner, a review of a book entitled, "The CIA and American Labor," authored by George Morris, Labor Editor of "The Worker," East Coast Communist newspaper. Boner is described therein as an active member of the Nashville SSOC chapter.

The Southern Conference for Human Welfare (SCHW) was cited as a Communist front by the House Committee on Un-American Activities, House Report 592, June 12, 1947. In the same house report, "The Southern Patriot" was cited as an "organ" of the SCHW.

An amendment to the charter of the SCHW dated April 26, 1946, changed its name to the Southern Conference Educational Fund, Incorporated, (SCEF) and stated its purpose to be to improve the educational and cultural stands of the Southern people in accordance with the highest American democratic institutions, traditions, and ideals.

The masthead of the April, 1967, issue of "The Southern Patriot" indicated that it is the publication of SCEF, editorial and business offices of which are located at 3210 West Broadway, Louisville, Kentucky, Eastern office of which is located at Suite 412, 799 Broadway, New York City, New York. "The Southern Patriot" is published once each month, except July. SCEF is stated to be dedicated to ending discrimination based on race, creed, color, sex, national origin, or economic condition.

[REDACTED] is identified as Executive Director of SCEF and [REDACTED] as editor of "The Southern Patriot."

Mrs. [REDACTED], [REDACTED] Kentucky, a self-admitted former member of the Communist Party (CP), Louisville, Kentucky, testified on December 11 and 13, 1954, in Jefferson County, Kentucky, Criminal Court in a state sedition prosecution against [REDACTED]. She identified [REDACTED] and his wife, [REDACTED] as having been known to her as members of the CP from January, 1951, to December, 1954.

The SCEF is self-described as having deep roots in the South where it began as the educational wing of the SCHW, organized in 1938 to work for economic and political reform. When the SCHW disbanded in the late 1940's, SCEF continued as

an independent organization, rallying support for integration and democracy and helping to stimulate and nurture new movements of the early 1960's. The SCEF maintained headquarters in Louisiana for twenty years, but in 1966 moved its headquarters to Louisville, Kentucky.

A source advised on March 2, 1961, that [REDACTED] a Communist Party functionary, stated at a meeting of the Communist Party in Baltimore, Maryland, on February 25, 1961, that the Communist Party is not connected with any progressive movement but indirectly they do have some influence in the SCEF.

A second source, who is familiar with some phases of Communist Party activity in the New Orleans area, advised on June 3, 1966, that during the time that the SCHW was in existence, members of the Communist Party were members of and worked actively in the SCHW; however, since the formation of the SCEF, Communist Party members have not been encouraged to work in the SCEF. The source stated that the SCEF is a progressive, liberal organization, which he considers a Communist Party front organization because it has gone along with the Communist Party on certain issues, particularly on the racial issue.

A third source advised on May 25, 1965, that [REDACTED] a Communist Party functionary, expressed great admiration for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and the SCEF, with which they are affiliated, and expressed the view that the SCEF is the best organization in South as far as doing effective work is concerned and that they have a better idea of what they are going, where they are heading, and influence other organizations for the better.

The second source also advised on June 3, 1966, that many people who are officials and supporters of the SCEF, while liberal in their views, are by no means Communists.

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

The only New Left organization at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Arkansas, is a chapter of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) which was organized on the University campus on February 5, 1968. As of June 28, 1968, this chapter reportedly had approximately thirty members.

Characterizations of the SSOC in Arkansas and the SSOC are contained in the appendix hereto.

The leaders of this group are [redacted] chairman; [redacted], SSOC traveler for Arkansas and secretary of the chapter, presently engaged in summer project of SSOC; and [redacted] who is working on the SSOC summer project as newsletter editor.

Set forth hereinafter is background information concerning these leaders.

[redacted] was born [redacted] at [redacted] Arkansas, and his legal residence is [redacted]. His father is employed as a food checker and cashier at the [redacted] and his mother is employed as a clerk in a grocery store. He attended high school at [redacted] and has lived his entire life at [redacted] except for the periods of time when he was away from [redacted] attending college.

In the fall of 1964 he enrolled at Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, and attended the Fine Arts College through the spring of 1965. He entered Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas, September 14, 1965, and attended through January, 1967. His Hendrix College record reveals [redacted] claimed that on May 15, 1964, he was granted a local preacher's license in the summer of 1964 and served as pastor of the Oma-Point Cedar Circuit, Arkadelphia, Arkansas, District of the Methodist Church.

[REDACTED] enrolled in the College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Arkansas, in the spring semester of 1967 and at the present time is attending the first six-weeks summer session. He lacks one hour of completing the requirements for his degree.

On May 30, 1968, [REDACTED] at Fayetteville, Arkansas, married [REDACTED], whose legal residence has been shown as [REDACTED] Arkansas.

[REDACTED] was born [REDACTED] at [REDACTED] and his father, [REDACTED], was born at [REDACTED]. His mother, [REDACTED] was born at [REDACTED]. His legal residence is in care of his parents. [REDACTED] father since 1962 has been employed as Superintendent of the [REDACTED] and is reported to have been a career Navy man.

[REDACTED] entered the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, the fall semester of 1964 and on 6/1/68 received a Bachelor of Arts Degree with a major in history.

[REDACTED] while at the University of Arkansas, took advanced ROTC, was a squad leader, a platoon leader, and a member of Pershing Rifles and Scabbard and Blade, which are military-type organizations.

On June 7, 1968, he requested he be released from ROTC summer camp and the ROTC program and be discharged from the U. S. Army Reserve on the grounds that he was a conscientious objector to military service. His letter revealed he based his conscientious objector claim that war had not brought peace but breeds war after war with maiming and killing; that it is not within his fabric to train to take another's life on orders from someone who is also human and, thus, fallible and he is compelled to say officially that he could not be trained to kill or consciously contribute to the effort of others to kill; that his belief is devoid of any un-patriotic feelings and based squarely on being a man.

In his letter he reveals he will request service in the Medical Service Corps if inducted but believes he could do a greater service for his country in the cause of peace as a career man in the foreign service working for this nation through the State Department.

On Tuesday, May 14, 1968, at 7:00 A. M., members of the SSOC and Black Students for Democracy, along with sympathizers totaling approximately twenty students, at one time blockaded the entrance to Hill Hall at the University of Arkansas where the daily newspaper "The Arkansas Traveler" is published.

The blockade was instituted as "The Arkansas Traveler" had failed to publish a letter written by a Negro student, [REDACTED], which had been submitted on April 10, 1968, in reply to a printed letter reportedly attacking [REDACTED] ^{MARTIN LUTHER KING} demonstrators claimed [REDACTED] had contacted the Traveler Office five times and on two occasions made suggested changes with the understanding it would be published; however, as of May 14, 1968, it had not been published. Too, the demonstrators indicated the blockade had been set up as the Board of Publications at the University had failed to allow [REDACTED] a hearing on the article and they desired to stop publication of "The Arkansas Traveler" in an effort to call attention to the discriminatory practices of the paper for failure to publish the article.

When the blockade was first instituted, no one was allowed to enter Hill Hall where journalism classes and the printing shop are located; however, by 8:30 A. M. students not connected with "The Arkansas Traveler" were allowed to enter the building.

A number of the demonstrators met with Dr. PALMER PILCHER, Vice President for Academic Affairs, which resulted in the above action at 8:30 A. M. At 9:00 A. M. a meeting was held of the Board of Publications concerning the allegation against "The Arkansas Traveler."

Areas of agreement were made with SSOC and Black Americans for a Democracy at 1:30 P. M. the same day and the blockade ceased at 1:30 P. M.; however, no publication of "The Arkansas Traveler" was put out May 14, 1968.

Since the blockade, Dr. PILCHER has held a number of meetings with SSOC and Black Americans for a Democracy, and there has not been further action taken by them against "The Arkansas Traveler."

The source stated that the SCEF is a progressive, liberal organization, which he considers a Communist Party front organization because it has gone along with the Communist Party on certain issues, particularly on the racial issue.

A third source advised on May 25, 1965, that [REDACTED] a Communist Party functionary, expressed great admiration for [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] and the SCEF, with which they are affiliated, and expressed the view that the SCEF is the best organization in South as far as doing effective work is concerned and that they have a better idea of what they are going, where they are heading, and influence other organizations for the better.

The second source also advised on June 3, 1966, that many people who are officials and supporters of the SCEF, while liberal in their views, are by no means Communists.

APPENDIX

STUDENTS FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIETY

The Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), as it is known today, came into being at a founding convention held at Port Huron, Michigan, in June, 1962. The SDS is an association of young people on the left and has a current program of protesting the draft, promoting a campaign for youth to develop a conscientious objector status, denouncing United States intervention in the war in Vietnam and to "radically transform" the university community, and provide for its complete control by students. Gus Hall, General Secretary, Communist Party, USA, when interviewed by a representative of United Press International in San Francisco, California, on May 14, 1965, described the SDS as a part of the "responsible left" which the Party has "going for us." At the June, 1965, SDS National Convention, an anti-communist proviso was removed from the SDS constitution. In the October 7, 1966, issue of "New Left Notes," the official publication of SDS, an SDS spokesman stated that there are some communists in SDS and they are welcome. The national headquarters of this organization as of April 18, 1967, was located in Room 206, 1608 West Madison Street, Chicago, Illinois.

In accordance with Bureau instructions set forth

furnished concerning the Little Rock Division and "New Left"
activity in this division:

(1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

The only "New Left" organizations in the Little
Rock Division are chapters of the Southern Student
Organizing Committee (SSOC) at the University of Arkansas,
Fayetteville, Ark., and Little Rock University, Little Rock,
Ark., as the Bureau was advised in referenced Little Rock
letter. No information has been received to date indicating
that either of these SSOC chapters has made any false
allegations of police brutality.

(2) Immorality

No information has been received to date concerning
the individuals active in the two SSOC chapters in Arkansas
which would be pertinent to this caption.

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(3) Action by College Administrators

There has only been one confrontation in the Little Rock Division between "New Left" groups and college officials and this was an incident that occurred on 5/14/68 at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, when between 25-30 students blocked passage to Hill Hall in an attempt to disrupt and stop the running of the Arkansas Traveler, the campus newspaper. This action was taken by a group calling themselves Black Americans for Democracy and the SSOC chapter at the University of Arkansas. There was no militancy in connection with this demonstration and, although the entrances to this building were blocked for the greater portion of one day, no information can be furnished to show the value of administrators taking a firm stand in resisting these elements since school officials promptly agreed to meet with representatives of the groups involved to discuss their grievances and the demonstration was canceled on the same day that it began. The matter has not been officially resolved to date. There has been no repetition of the incident.

The only "New Left" organizations in the Little Rock Division are chapters of the Southern Student Organizing Committee (SSOC) formed in February, 1968, at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Arkansas, and during April, 1968, by students of Little Rock University (LRU) at Little Rock, Arkansas. The University of Arkansas SSOC chapter in reported to currently have approximately 30 members and the LRU SSOC chapter has approximately 10 to 12 members.

Neither of these organizations appear to have received any wide acceptance among the students at their respective universities and the members, for the most part, are considered "oddballs" and students who are not in the main stream of the student activity. In view of this, Little Rock Division does not recommend any specific counterintelligence action be taken against either of these chapters at this time.

On a national basis, it is felt that the most effective form of counterintelligence activity against these New Left groups would be for the Bureau to utilize all possible news sources in an attempt to ridicule the New Left and their activist leaders through cartoons and cooperative syndicated writers who specialize in satire since this type of humor is easily understood and accepted by the majority of college students. It has been the experience of the Little Rock Office that most college students do not want to become identified with these individuals involved in New Left type activities.
