However, during the past several months, there has been little or no organized SDS activities on the campuses within this division.

The NHO is in receipt of a letter dated July 6, 1970, from [redacted] MD, FACS, [redacted], Wilton, Ct., wherein he expresses his gratitude to the SAC for the speaking services of an FBI agent who in his demeanor "exemplifies the high quality of men in the Bureau."

In his letter, [redacted] asks if it would be possible to have 1000 copies of the Director's pamphlet "An Analysis of the New Left - A Gospel of Nihilism." He points out that at the request of students from Barrington College, Rhode Island, he is providing them with a seminar, "The Responsibilities of Christian Leadership" and the President of King's College student body (Briarcliff Manor, New York) will be present.

This seminar is scheduled for 7/24, 25, and 26/70 and at this time he would like to distribute the Director's article. He said it would be distributed to at least 3 campuses (through attendance at the seminar), Barrington, King's and Fairfield U.

He also wrote that he personally owns a color film documentary, "Communists on Campus" which has been shown in the Darien, Conn., high school systems to students at Barrington College, and Fairfield University; the Police Chief of Norwalk, and other groups.

In accordance with Bureau instructions, the following information is set forth:

1. Operations Under Consideration. Bureau permission is requested to afford [redacted] Wesleyan University, Middletown, Conn., a confidential briefing would, of course, be from public source material and would include the viewing of the BPP movie, "Off the Pig."

On 2/25/69, SA [redacted] of the NHO contacts [redacted] in connection with an applicant case. At the conclusion of the interview regarding applicant, [redacted] questioned SA [redacted] concerning the BPP and New Left activity on the Wesleyan campus. SA [redacted] was guarded in his statements and careful to follow Bureau policy regarding discussion of these matters. [redacted] interest in these matters, however, offers an excellent opportunity under the Counterintelligence Program to assist NHO in these matters and to ingratiate itself with one of the top educators in the state of Conn.

This office has experienced excellent relations with [redacted] in the past. It is felt that a confidential briefing would enhance prompt cooperation with this office and would not cause any embarrassment to the Bureau. By offering this type of briefing, NHO will make a friend of the Bureau and will avail itself to limited coverage through the president of the BPP and New Left, both of which are active on the Wesleyan campus.

b. NHO will continue to furnish information to area police departments regarding illegal activities of BPP and SDS members developed in the course of other investigations or from established sources. Lawful harassment and successful prosecution will tend to discredit the captioned movements by disgracing the leadership. It will also serve to keep this leadership out of detailed planning. This office is aware of the danger of creating a martyr and will conduct this phase accordingly.

2. Operations Being Effected. As authorized by the Bureau, this office is furnishing [redacted] WNHC-TV, with public source type data concerning the Black Nationalist and New Left Movements in Conn.

3. Tangible Results. Constant coverage of all BPP press conferences and lectures by [redacted] and other members of the press has resulted in an awakening of the moderate Negro community to the threat the BPP poses to the tranquility that exists. Liaison sources have reported a concern over the rise of brash militancy and have begun to discuss the possibility of forming a moderate vocal group to combat the militants. This movement will be closely followed through liaison sources and, if the opportunity presents itself, NHO will recommend appropriate counterintelligence action.

4. Developments of CI Interest On 3/19/69, [redacted] advised that [redacted] and [redacted] BPP-New Haven, had discussed with BPP Headquarters the problems being created by [redacted], BPP-Easton, in the Conn. area. [redacted] was reportedly driving in a [redacted] New Haven offices, apparently for his own use. [redacted] was termed by [redacted] as a renegade and was so described in a very profane manner. [redacted] complaint was that [redacted] was taking money from his territory.

[REDACTED] also stated that SDS at the University would take its movement underground for "revolutionary purposes." NH stated that UACB, it would contact [REDACTED], WNHC-TV, NH, calling his attention to these statements and supporting a television commentary and news editorial attacking [REDACTED] for his statements. [REDACTED] is a highly reliable and established source of the NH Office who has offered his services to NH on a number of occasions. On one such occasion he furnished tapes which were used by the Bureau in a successful prosecution.

The February 7, 1968, issue of the "New Haven Journal Courier" on page five contains an article concerning SDS activities at the University of Connecticut and Wesleyan University.

The article reports that [redacted] (Bureau file 100-450740), an [redacted] at the University of Connecticut, told a news conference called to coincide with the resumption of job interviews at the Storrs Campus, "We will no longer march in peaceful lines ... but will create a viable revolutionary movement." The article further reported that SDS at the University of Connecticut would take their movement underground for "revolutionary purposes."

Consistent with and in furtherance of the aims of this program it is believed that statewide publicity through the media of television commentary and news editorials should be given to the revolutionary statements made by a professor of a state supported educational institution.

For the information of the Bureau, [REDACTED] is a highly reliable established source of the New Haven Office, who, on a number of occasions, has offered his services and the facilities of WNHC-TV to this office. He was responsible for this office obtaining tapes of several speeches of Yale University [REDACTED] which were used in the successful prosecution of [REDACTED] ET AL.

Of particular interest was the activity of SDS at the University of Connecticut protesting the presence of a Dow Chemical Co. representative on the campus 10/30/68 and the resulting disciplinary action taken against some students and faculty members involved.

This situation has been and continues to be followed closely to insure that no counterintelligence possibilities are overlooked.

For the information of San Diego, [redacted] first came to the attention of the New Haven Office in about 1952 when it was alleged that he was a member of the Labor Youth League and active in CP and related activities. He has been the subject of periodic investigation since that time, and is currently included on the Reserve Index - A of this office. Since the middle or late 1950's, informants of this office familiar with some CP and related activities have furnished no information indicating CP activity on the part of [redacted]

For the additional information of San Diego, it was ascertained in August, 1968, that [redacted] and [redacted] who maintain a residence at [redacted] Waterbury, Conn., have gone to San Francisco for a year where [redacted] will either enroll or teach at the University of California at Berkeley. His residence at [redacted] Berkeley, California, has been verified, however, his status at the University has not yet been determined.

A review of this file disclosed no public source information concerning participation in or obvious leanings toward communist and/or related activities, including the New Left, on the part of [redacted]

Re: Washington Field teletype, 10/9/68, captioned "VIDEM."

Referenced teletype disclosed that a confidential source advised that an Administrative Committee meeting of the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam (NMC) will be held 10 a.m., October 13, 1968, in The Bush Room, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The notice received from NMC, New York City, states they have been listed as the "New University Conference" and cautions not to mention the NMC if it is necessary to ask directions to the Bush Room.

New Haven is not aware of the arrangements being made or the publicity being given to this meeting but from the above subterfuge it appears that some publicity is anticipated.

Consistent with the aims of of captioned program and providing that the source of the information would not be placed in jeopardy, it is believed that this affords an excellent opportunity to cause the NMC considerable embarrassment if a "friendly" newspaper was to make inquiries concerning the "New University Conference" and discover that it is actually the NMC utilizing the sanctity of a university to plan its program of disruption and violence

Enclosed herewith are Xerox copies of two articles which appeared in the "Hartford Courant," a daily newspaper published at Hartford, Conn., in its issues of 9/12/68 and 9/13/68.

The articles relate to a new system adopted by Trinity College, Hartford, Conn., authorizing the college's new president, Dr. THEODORE A. LOCKWOOD, to "take immediate and firm steps" if there is a student sit-in similar to one last April. According to the article of 9/12/68, the proposal, endorsed by the faculty, gives the president authority to act swiftly if the operation of the college "is seriously threatened or impared." The president would warn the offenders, give them reasonable time to disperse, and suspend them if they failed to disperse. If necessary the president would call on civil authorities to end the disorder.

It is to be noted that [REDACTED] of United Aircraft Corporation and a trustee of Trinity College, was one of the trustees referred to above as having been imprisoned in a college building during a demonstration last spring. [REDACTED] expressed the opinion that the Trinity College Chapter of SDS was responsible for this demonstration and requested [REDACTED] for Pratt and Whitney Division, United Aircraft Corporation, to obtain background information concerning SDS in order that Trinity College authorities could effectively cope with the group in the future.

It would appear that the authorized information made available to [REDACTED] through [REDACTED] had considerable impact and in all likelihood was influential in the decision of Trinity College officials in making its announcement, through the president, that positive and firm action will be taken against demonstrators and demonstrations that seriously threaten or impair the operation of the college.

Trinity Head Defends Freedom—With Order

By MICHAEL TOOKE

Trinity College President Theodore D. Lockwood Thursday called for a "delicate balance" between academic freedom and academic responsibility on campus.

The new president said students, faculty and administration are all part of the community and should participate in decisions.

However, he pledged that "any actions which paralyze the orderly operation of the college do too grave a disservice to the educational hopes of the entire community and may properly lead to the separation of the individual from the college."

Dr. Lockwood spoke to about 1,200 students and faculty members at an all-college convocation outside the college chapel. He received polite applause at the beginning and end of his speech.

Referring specifically to a student demonstration last spring in which trustees were imprisoned in a college building, Dr. Lockwood said, "No responsible body can deliberate under such

conditions nor can the college tolerate such a direct violation of freedom of action and movement."

But he also said students will be asked and should feel free to express their opinions. He said he already has named a 12-man advisory body consisting of four students, four faculty members and four administrators to confer with him on issues before the college. According to Lockwood, the group will be empowered to discuss problems and pass upon recommendations subject to the approval of the president and other bodies involved.

Lockwood endorsed the recommendation of a special commission for a disciplinary board made up of three students, three faculty members and three administrators. He said the new system "safeguards the rights of all members of the community."

According to Lockwood, the college must have an established code of behavior and must set standards on what is and is not acceptable within the

community. He also said the college must respect the laws of the society in general and not offer protection or "special privilege" against reasonable exercise of the law.

He urged students and faculty to discuss issues of importance to the nation, but said he believes the college itself should have no formal stand on matters as a "partisan political agency" unless they directly affect college life. He said he intends to set aside a day for deliberation of major problems some time this fall.

In Lockwood's view, the college is a place where members are free to discuss issues without fear of institutional censure or discipline, but where no individual has the right to interfere with the freedom of others.

"Freedom is not the freedom to do what we like whenever we please," Lockwood said. "Freedom comes from a feeling of necessity, another way of expressing the idea that freedom has meaning only within order."

Trinity Faculty Gives President New Power

The Trinity College faculty unanimously endorsed a statement Wednesday to give the college's new president, Dr. Theodore D. Lockwood, support to take immediate and firm steps if there is a student sit-in similar to one last April.

The teachers also overwhelmingly adopted a new judicial system proposed by a special commission on regulatory procedures.

The new system calls for a disciplinary board of three faculty, three students and three administrators to hear all cases and provides for an appeal to the president who would have veto power over the board. Rules of the college are being reviewed by a committee appointed by the president.

The commission's report recognizes that final authority rests with the board of trustees but states that the trustees would exercise that power only in unusual cases and then through the president. The document had been approved by the trustees Friday and still is to go before the student body.

The faculty moved to support Dr. Lockwood's statement that he resolved "to engage all who are properly concerned with the educational process at Trinity in taking responsibility to improve the quality of life and of education found at the college."

President Lockwood said he

was reluctant to raise the issue of campus disruption at the very start of what I hope will be a year devoted to careful deliberation of the academic objectives and programs which are our primary obligation and common interest."

But, he added, he believed the faculty wanted to know whether he had some plan for handling the kind of disorder which whipped the campus last spring and has provoked much thought and controversy since then.

The proposal endorsed by the faculty gives the president authority to act swiftly if the operation of the college "is seriously threatened or impaired."

The president would warn the offenders, give them reasonable time to disperse and suspend them if they failed to disperse. If necessary the president would call on civil authorities to end the disorder.

Dr. Lockwood is to address an all-college convocation today at 4:15 p.m. and is expected to discuss relations within a college community.

On April 22, 1968, at 5 p.m., about 200 Trinity College students led by members of Trinity Association of Negroes (TAN) and now known as Trinity Coalition of Negroes, blocked the exit of a meeting room in Williams Memorial Hall on the Trinity campus and prevented members of the Board of Trustees of the college from leaving the room at the termination of a meeting of the board. The group demanded approval of a demand for funds for additional scholarships for Negro students.

The trustees announced that they would make no decision under pressure and the demonstrators refused to leave the building without receiving assurance of the trustees acceptance of the scholarship program. It was decided about 8:30 p.m. to permit the trustees to leave. The students, however, remained in the building overnight. The occupation of the building ended early in the morning on April 24, 1968.

NH T-1 advised on June 18, 1968, that almost all of the membership of the Trinity College Chapter of SDS participated in the above affair and that furthermore, it was strongly suspected and in fact, generally believed on the Trinity campus that SDS was almost entirely responsible for the affair.

A committee composed of administration officials, faculty and students reached a determination that those involved in the above incident should be punished by being required to raise \$400 each toward a scholarship fund for needy Negro students at the college. The Board of Trustees, the highest administrative body of the college, overruled the above decision and ruled that each of the 168 students who had admitted participation in the demonstration should have entered on their college records a notation of disciplinary probation to remain in effect until their graduations from the college.

It is believed that this information and possibly a characterization of SDS and a sample copy of an application for membership in SDS could be correlated and furnished to Mr. [redacted] on a strictly confidential basis for the information of Mr. [redacted]. It is to be noted that the membership application contained a self characterization of the SDS.

The Resident Agents at Hartford, Connecticut, have had a close and confidential relationship with the members of the Internal Security Staff of the Pratt and Whitney Division over an extended period of years and the confidentiality of this relationship has always been maintained. It is believed that [redacted] concern about the activities of SDS presents an excellent opportunity to institute counterintelligence action in accordance with the provisions of referenced Bureau letter.

It is believed that the compilation of the numerous articles pertaining to SDS activity at Trinity College would have a far greater impact on [redacted], and as trustee of the college he would be in a position to recommend administrative action against SDS and its activities at Trinity College.

The New Haven Office is closely following the activities of the various SDS chapters and related groups, and every effort will be made to capitalize upon any and all opportunities for counterintelligence action.

Re Bureau letter to Albany and all offices dated 5/23/68.
The following is submitted in accordance with instructions in referenced Bureau letter:

1) False Allegations of Police Brutality

To date the New Haven Division has received no information concerning allegations of police brutality arising from student-police encounters in connection with demonstrations involving the New Left movement.

2) Immorality

No information has come to the attention of this division reflecting on the morality or unsavory habits and living conditions of individuals associated with the New Left.

3) Action by College Administrators

The "Hartford Times", a daily newspaper published in Hartford, Connecticut, in its edition of June 12, 1968, contained an article captioned: "Faculty at Arms Over Trinity Move". The article disclosed that the records of 168 Trinity College students who sat-in April 22-23 have been tagged with a "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" notation and the action has aroused faculty tempers. The action was a result of student demands for more Negro rights which touched off a 32 hour sit-in of the Administration Building where eight trustees and two college administrators were virtual prisoners.

One unnamed faculty member was quoted as saying, "Unless this is changed over the summer, we are bound for a much more radical confrontation when the students return." He added that Peace Corps headquarters in Washington had told him that such an entry on a student record "would be highly prejudicial" to the students chances for joining the Corps. He said, "this is the only college in the country we know of where the trustees can enter such an item on a student's record."

According to the article, President ALBERT C. JACOBS in a memo to the faculty and administration said "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" was entered on the student records because, in effect, that's what the trustees wanted. According to the memo, the students were being punished for "restricting the right of free access and exit of eight trustees and two college administrators in or around the Trustees' Room of Trinity College between 4:30 PM and 8:30 PM, Monday, April 22, 1968."

The article indicated that students tagged with a "DISCIPLINARY PROBATION" may appeal the punishment to the Faculty Committee on Academic Standing and Discipline anytime after January 15, 1969.
