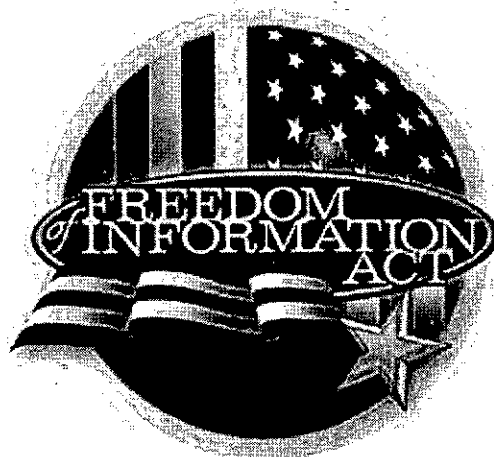

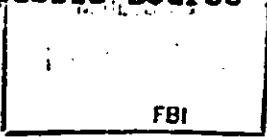

Re Pittsburgh airtel to the Bureau dated 5/1/70, captioned as above.

Relet requested Bureau authority to furnish information concerning [redacted] (BUFILE: 100-452697), to [redacted] an established and reliable source at [redacted] Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and to suggest to [redacted] that the [redacted] may desire to call to the attention of the University of Pittsburgh (UP) administration questions concerning the desirability of [redacted] continuing as a professor at the UP.

As set out in Pittsburgh letter dated 7/28/70, captioned as above, this information was furnished to [redacted] and on 7/16/70, he indicated that he had been informed by the UP administration that [redacted] contract with UP would not be renewed in the fall of 1970.

Pittsburgh has received information which indicates, however, that [redacted] continues in his employment as a Professor of Economics at UP.

On 12/21/70, [redacted] was convicted in Allegheny County Criminal Court on a charge of Resisting Arrest while participating in an anti-Vietnam demonstration in Pittsburgh on 10/15/69. He received a one-year suspended sentence, and was required to pay costs of the case.

Bureau authority is requested to recontact [redacted] concerning [redacted] and furnish this additional information relating to his arrest and conviction to him. [redacted] has been extremely cooperative in this matter in the past, and has exhibited a concern about the continued employment of [redacted] at UP.

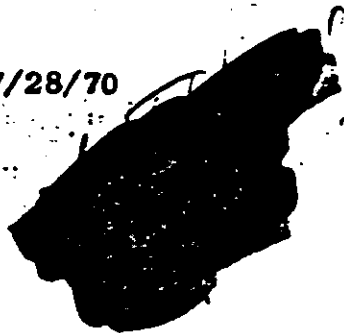

1. Potential Counterintelligence Action U

There appears to be good potential for counter-intelligence action against the Peace and Freedom Center (PFC), 618 South Millvale Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa., and the Revolutionary Socialist Union (RSU), University of Pittsburgh (UP), Pittsburgh. U



The RSU is a campus-approved student organization at the UP. The RSU allows both students and non-students as members, contrary to UP policy. It is proposed that an established source at the UP be furnished this information on a confidential basis so that UP officials can challenge RSU leaders in this regard, and, possibly, cause the RSU to restrict its membership to UP students.

Recommendations relative to above proposals will be submitted to Bureau when full details have been formulated.

2. Pending Counterintelligence Action

At present, Pittsburgh does not have any pending counterintelligence action.

3. Tangible Results

On 4/1/70, [redacted] an established and reliable source at [redacted], Pittsburgh, was furnished information relative to 3-day conference scheduled at Carnegie-Mellon University (C-MU), Pittsburgh, Pa., 4/3-5/70, as outlined in relet dated 3/31/70. This office anticipated that [redacted] armed with this information, could prevent this conference from being held at C-MU.

On 4/3/70, [redacted] advised that he had furnished information relative to proposed conference [redacted] and that the C-MU Administration had then taken steps to cancel permission for the conference. When the originators of the conference were informed that C-MU had cancelled permission for the conference, they protested C-MU's decision, claiming, among other things, that C-MU had reneged on its promise that the conference could be held on its campus. The C-MU Administration relented by allowing the conference to be held as scheduled provided the conference did not include the planning of strategy for the Gulf Action Project, a project intended to disrupt the 4/28/70, stockholders meeting of the Gulf Oil Corporation, scheduled to be held at Pittsburgh.

In regard to proposed counterintelligence action against [redacted] as mentioned in relet dated 3/31/70, it is to be noted that [redacted] reportedly has reconciled his differences with the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP), and is now considered a CPWP member in good standing. CPWP leaders reportedly expressed the opinion that [redacted] was trustworthy in every respect and, in effect, agreed to let [redacted] indiscretions go by the Board. Pittsburgh has

No further plans of counterintelligence action against [REDACTED] at this time.

On 5/21/70, [REDACTED] above, was furnished information concerning [REDACTED] as contained in reairtel dated 5/1/70. On 7/16/70 [REDACTED] advised that he had been in contact with the UP Administration and had questioned the desirability of [REDACTED] continuing as a Professor of Economics at the UP. [REDACTED] stated that he had been informed by the UP Administration that [REDACTED] contract with the UP would not be renewed upon its termination this fall. Pittsburgh will continue to follow this matter to its conclusion before claiming a tangible result in connection with this program.

The New Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam is sponsoring demonstrations at stockholders meetings of large corporations during the period April 20 - 28, 1970, as a protest to the military industrial complex and the war. One such protest is against Gulf Oil Company, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

The Gulf Oil Project, the local Pittsburgh group which will demonstrate against Gulf Oil, has scheduled a planning session for the demonstration at Carnegie-Melbn University in Pittsburgh.

Pittsburgh advises in attached that unless advised to the contrary it will contact an established and reliable source which can suggest to authorities at Carnegie-Melbn University that the holding of this planning session could be a source of embarrassment to [REDACTED]

Upon further reflection and due to recent developments in the New Left Movement (NLM) and changes in the status of [redacted], it is felt that these counterintelligence proposals, as briefly outlined in referenced letter, would at this time be unproductive.

[redacted], a member of the District Committee of the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP), until his suspension from the CPWP during October, 1969, is an active participant in NLM organizations and activities, it being noted that he is a member of both the PFC and the Pittsburgh Veterans for Peace (PVP). [redacted] was suspended from the CPWP for his close association with members of the Weatherman faction, Students for a Democratic Society (SDS). Shortly after his suspension from the CPWP, it came to the attention of CPWP leaders that:

1. [redacted] had callously mistreated a female CPWP member with whom he had been living and that
2. [redacted] had reportedly received a letter from the Government requesting that he testify in behalf of the Government.

Subsequent to arrest, [REDACTED] and the other defendants reportedly received a hearing and were bound over for the Allegheny County Grand Jury. The defendants were indicted by the Grand Jury and will appear in court possibly in 1970.

[REDACTED] continues to be extremely active in the Peace and Freedom Center (PFC), Pittsburgh, Pa., and is closely associated with the leadership of the PFC, which is one of the most active peace organizations in Pittsburgh.

[REDACTED] reportedly is an active member of the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP) and has close associations with many CPWP leaders and members.

There appears to be good potential for counterintelligence action against the PFC since [REDACTED] is known to Pittsburgh "peace workers" as a very active participant in the PFC and its activities.

It is proposed that an anonymous letter be mailed to individuals who are known to be active in the Pittsburgh peace movement pointing out that allegations recently made in an anonymous letter (see below) which, in effect, questioned the moral character of [REDACTED] and his fitness to be affiliated with the PFC, were unfounded. An attempt will be made in proposed letter to create the impression that [REDACTED] is serving as an informant for a law enforcement agency.

Pittsburgh was considering counterintelligence action against the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) in the Pittsburgh area. However, there is no longer a chapter of the SDS at Pittsburgh. During September, 1969, the University of Pittsburgh Chapter, SDS, ceased to exist as an organization.

At present Pittsburgh does not have any pending counterintelligence action.

3. Tangible Results

In compliance with Bureau authority as set forth in Bulet to Pittsburgh dated 6/19/69, Pittsburgh made fictitious mailing to Pittsburgh newspapers on 6/23/69. However, these newspapers did not publish these anonymous letters.

On 11/18/69, Pittsburgh mailed anonymous letter as proposed in relet dated 10/31/69. Subsequent to this mailing, a reliable source advised that certain CPWP leaders mentioned that they were of the opinion that this mailing was undertaken by the Government to harass the peace movement and that they believed the best course of action was to ignore this mailing. No further information in this regard has been received.

Since coming to Pittsburgh I have enjoyed reading your newspaper and have sent in donations from time-to-time to enable you to continue its publication.

I see that [redacted] is still a member of the Editorial Board of the Peace and Freedom News. To come right to the point, have you ever questioned the moral character of [redacted] and his fitness to hold this position of responsibility with the Center?

Did you know that [redacted] and some of his associates were busted in [redacted] apartment several months ago for possession of drugs? They are now awaiting trial. Two of [redacted] associates, at the time of the bust, were having sexual relations in [redacted] apartment. Didn't he know what was taking place in his own apartment?

Besides, a friend in the Movement informed me that [redacted] was a Marxist and took his orders from such communists as [redacted] and her husband, [redacted]. I am unable to term this information the gospel truth, but my friend vouches for the validity of this information. I've personally observed [redacted] with the [redacted] on several occasions. Ask [redacted] about this! Don't quote me!

All of this to say -- I don't think the Center should be beholden to any person or organization, especially to communists and possibly the Communist Party. Then too, I don't think anyone, even [redacted] should hold a responsible position with the Center, if they are of poor moral character.

"Dear Sirs:

"The article in the June 11 'Post Gazette' (Pittsburgh 'Press' where appropriate) says that the State Police assaulted academic freedom by investigating the visit of two poets to an English class at Westinghouse and they should be reprimanded. If anybody should be reprimanded, it should be the teacher who brought the poets there. Both of them are known for being against the draft laws and they preach that these laws should not be obeyed. Also, how come a man, David Worstell, who has been convicted as a draft dodger, can teach our children at Westinghouse and bring in other speakers who are opposed to our country to talk to the students, who are a captive audience? That is where the assault on academic freedom is.

"How come the principal at Westinghouse and the Board of Education permit this type of action to go on? And why is such a teacher as this permitted to continue to poison the minds of students?

"The ACLU jumped on the wrong people when they blamed the State Police. The State Police should make the complete results of their investigation public so all parents would know what is going on in their schools.

Dear Friend:

I have just finished reading the February, 1969, edition of the Pittsburgh Peace and Freedom News. In my opinion and also in the opinions of several friends the P & F News is attempting to cover too broad a scope, e. g. the grape boycott, instead of sticking to matters relative to peace and resistance. If you ask me, it appears that the P & F News is just another publication like the Guardian or the Daily World. Perhaps, there are reasons for similarities between the P & F News and these radical newspapers.

Is it possible that [REDACTED], the "ramrod" of the Peace and Freedom Center (the publisher of P & F News) and his wife, [REDACTED] are being unduly influenced by members of the Communist Party in the Pittsburgh area? Apparently this is the case. The [REDACTED] are pretty closely associated with [REDACTED] and his wife, [REDACTED] according to leaders in the Pittsburgh peace movement.

I certainly am not in a position to identify the [REDACTED] as CP members. However, when I participated in a recent demonstration in support of a fellow-resistor at the Federal Building on March 5, 1969, I did see [REDACTED] in the company of Gus Hall, a leader of the CP in New York. I'm positive of Gus Hall's identity as I saw him when he appeared on the Ohio University campus as a speaker during the Spring of 1967. Also, I've seen him several times on the TV in New York when I lived there.

There appears to be good potential for counter-intelligence action against the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) in the Pittsburgh, Pa., area. Until recently there were three active SDS chapters in Pittsburgh, namely the Carnegie-Mellon University (C-MU) Chapter, the Duquesne University (DU) Chapter, and the University of Pittsburgh (UP) Chapter. Reportedly the DU Chapter is defunct and the C-MU Chapter is approaching this state. The UP Chapter has made very little headway in growth and has few accomplishments to its credit to date. The lack of competent leadership and campus issues of general student interest has possibly led to this SDS situation at Pittsburgh.

There appears to be good potential for counter-intelligence action against the Peace and Freedom Center (PFC), (Bufile 100-449396; PG file 100-15678), 5899 Ellsworth Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa., a non-membership New Left organization which initiates, promotes and coordinates anti-Vietnam war activities at Pittsburgh. [redacted] serves as full-time Field Secretary of the PFC, and is assisted in this endeavor by his wife, [redacted], a member of the Steering Committee of the PFC.

It is to be noted that both [redacted] have been reported in attendance at meetings of the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP). The [redacted] are known to have worked very closely with CPWP leaders [redacted] and his wife, [redacted] in connection with anti-Vietnam activities at Pittsburgh. The [redacted] are aware of the CPWP connections of the [redacted]. The [redacted] are known to have turned down invitations to join the CPWP. In regard to [redacted], on 12/23/68, [redacted] (Conceal; reliable) advised that at a CPWP meeting [redacted] when name of [redacted] was mentioned, [redacted] stated that [redacted] was not a communist and that [redacted] had many shortcomings. This unfavorable publicity might very well cause the Students Recognition Committee for Campus Organizations to question their approval of the SDS as a recognized student organization and cause that committee to deny the SDS future recognition on the campus.

Relet 5/29/68, advised that detailed plans for counterintelligence action against the Peace and Freedom Center (PFC), Pittsburgh, would be submitted by the Pittsburgh Office. This letter noted that [redacted] worked full-time to promote PFC activities. Since this Office is presently conducting an Antiriot Law investigation of [redacted] Pittsburgh, for the time being is not submitting proposals for counterintelligence action against the PFC.

The Pittsburgh Office proposes counterintelligence action against the University of Pittsburgh (UP), Chapter of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS), Pittsburgh, Pa.

On 8/12/68, the Students Recognition Committee for Campus Organizations at the UP approved the SDS as a campus organization and granted the organization a two-month temporary recognition. During this two-month period, SDS must obtain a charter from the National SDS; submit a progress report concerning its recruiting efforts on the UP campus; and submit the identity of the major SDS officer who is responsible for SDS activities on the campus.

The UP is a private educational institution and receives substantial funds from the State of Pennsylvania to insure its continued operation. Campus-approved student organizations at the UP are usually allocated \$500 each year for the support of their campus activities. It is

Coverage of the WVU Chapter of the SDS has been limited to information provided by established sources on the WVU campus. Pittsburgh has intensified its efforts to develop

live informant coverage of this SDS Chapter, as this office realizes its coverage of this group through established sources is inadequate. The WVU SDS Chapter reportedly suspended its activities at the conclusion of the 1967-1968 school year and is not expected to resume its activities until school commences in September, 1968. This suspension of SDS activities on the WVU has hampered this office in developing live informant coverage but, nevertheless, intensified efforts are being made in this direction through current informant programs described above.

On June 4, 1968, a source who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that as of that date, the Student - Faculty Committee on Student Organizations at West Virginia University (WVU) had taken no official action relative to application of WVU Chapter of students for a Democratic Society (DS), submitted during October, 1967, requesting recognition as a student organization at WVU. Source noted that any organization utilizing WVU facilities for its meetings must be a campus-approved organization.

The DS is characterized in the appendix hereto.

On January 3, 1968, a second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that the membership of the WVU Chapter of DS then consisted of no more than six to eight members.

On January 19, 1968, first source, above, advised that aforementioned application listed officers and faculty advisor of the WVU Chapter of DS as follows:

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Member of the Vietnam Protection Center for Defiant Prisoners, a temporary processing center at Camp Ramo, Ind. contained a record, W. C. Davidson's Justice Number 83, which indicated that on / at 11:30 p.m. of October 21, 1967, at [redacted] Vietnam, [redacted] was arrested for offenses listed as "Crossed police line tied to two other people. Refused to go back." The disposition of this case indicated that Davidson fined \$100 and given a ten-day suspended sentence. [redacted] was listed as being 23 years of age, having been born [redacted]. This arrest was not substantiated through fingerprints.

[redacted] was one of the 575 individuals arrested at the Pentagon by U. S. Marshals during a massive demonstration sponsored by the National Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam at Washington, D.C., on October 21, 1967, which culminated with a march on the Pentagon and picketing there until shortly after midnight of October 23, 1967.

On June 4, 1968, First source, above, advised that to his knowledge, the WVU Chapter of the SDS and its members have engaged in no activities on the WVU campus since January 25, 1968, and January 26, 1968, when the members reportedly participated in a demonstration protesting the appearance of representatives of the Dow Chemical Company and the Central Intelligence Agency who visited the campus to interview students as prospective employees. First source noted that this demonstration had been orderly and peaceful.

First source advised that he understood that the WVU Chapter of the SDS curtailed its activities on the campus after its president [redacted] withdrew as a WVU student during early January, 1968, after suffering a back injury during the 1967 Christmas holidays. This source stated that to his knowledge, the WVU Chapter has not held any membership meetings since [redacted] withdrawal from WVU.

On July 1, 1968, a source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that as of that date the Students for Peace (SFP), a campus-approved student organization at the University of Pittsburgh (UP), was the only New Left organization on the UP campus. The SFP has a membership of about 45-50 members from among the faculty, graduate students and undergraduate students from UP.

The SFP is characterized in the appendix hereto.

On January 16, 1968, a second source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that as of that date the officers of SFP were as follows:

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faculty advisor. Source added that the SPP's next election was scheduled for sometime in the spring of 1968, but no definite date had been set.

On July 1, 1968, first source, above, advised that the SPP's officers and faculty advisor were the same as those listed above. Source noted that the SPP did not hold its scheduled election during the spring of 1968.

First source advised that during past year there had been no disruptive activities on the UP campus. Source stated that during the past year the SPP had sponsored demonstrations protesting the Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) on the UP campus, and the appearance of representatives of Dow Chemical Company on UP campus to recruit students as prospective employees, but that these demonstrations had been orderly and peaceful. Source noted that the probability of acts of violence or civil disobedience were minimized in connection with aforementioned demonstrations because UP officials had announced that such acts by students would be in violation of the UP's rules and regulations and that violators faced arrest and possible expulsion from the UP.

STUDENTS FOR PEACE (SFP)

The April 5, 1966, issue of "The Pitt News," a student newspaper at the University of Pittsburgh (UP), Pittsburgh, Pa., contained an article announcing the formation of a new student organization called "Students for Peace" (SFP). The article described SFP as a pacifist group, acting as an information center, which hoped to emphasize the importance of "seeking non-violent solutions into both international and domestic crises." The article further stated that the organization grew out of the desire of several University pacifists to present students normally opposed to war with an alternative to "ROTC now or draft later."

On September 21, 1966, a source advised that at the first meeting of SFP during the 1966-67 school year on September 13, 1966, Bill Weber, SFP president, stated that SFP is not a pacifist group and anyone who expected it to be so could leave the meeting. Weber said the past president was a pacifist, but he would lead the organization as a militant group. He stated that it was not the purpose of the SFP to do only what the University allows, but since SFP was the only radical group on campus, they intended to do whatever they felt necessary to express the radical viewpoint.

On February 23, 1966, source advised that efforts by the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP) to infiltrate, dominate, control or influence policies of SFP have, for the most part, been unsuccessful to date. Source advised, however, the CPWP has been interested in SFP since its beginning and has made efforts to recruit members of SFP into the Communist Party Youth Club (CPYC) and succeeded in recruiting one, Daniel Smullyan, who became a member of the Executive Board of the CPYC as the Club treasurer. He transferred to New York City after withdrawing from the UP in early 1966. One other SFP member, Richard Sayre, is currently a member of the Pittsburgh Chapter of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (PDC).

Source advised that the SFP has been closely associated with protest groups in the Pittsburgh area, especially those opposing the war in Vietnam. They vigorously oppose ROTC on the UP campus and protested recruiters from Dow Chemical Company when they came to the UP campus to recruit employees in November, 1967. Source further advised that several members of the SFP, especially the leaders, are closely associated with members of the CNWP and the PDC, whom they know to be members of these organizations.

The information requested in relet is set forth below under the appropriate headings:

FALSE ALLEGATIONS OF POLICE BRUTALITY

Pittsburgh files relative to the New Left contain no information relative to alleged police brutality in this division.

IMMORALITY

The Pittsburgh Office has not received any specific data relative to immorality on part of New Left adherents. From time to time, Pittsburgh sources have furnished general information indicating that several couples associated with the New Left movement were living together without benefit of marriage. These sources have been alerted to furnish specific data in this regard so that captioned program may be intelligently pursued.

ACTION BY COLLEGE ADMINISTRATORS

On 10/5/67, three students at the University of Pittsburgh (UP), Pittsburgh, Pa., namely, [redacted] laid down in front of marching ROTC troops performing their drills on the UP drill field to demonstrate their opposition to ROTC. The students

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were described as the "beatnik-type" with beards and no shoes. The students were removed from the drill field by the UP Security Police and taken at their request to the Dean of Men, HERBERT G. MC GIBBENY. After their arrival at the office of the Dean, the students had nothing to say. Dean MC GIBBENY requested the students to appear before him again on 10/9/67.

On 10/9/67, Dean MC GIBBENY conferred with above students, however, no decision was reached as to what action the UP would take against them.

On 10/11/67, Dean MC GIBBENY reportedly discussed this matter with the Chancellor's Committee on University Policies. The Dean was in favor of suspending the students but the members of the Committee felt that since this was the first offense for each student, suspension would be too drastic. The Committee recommended that the students be placed on probation and warned that future violations would result in their suspension.

On 10/13/67, it was reported that Dean MC GIBBENY was carrying out the recommendations of the Committee by sending letters to the three above-mentioned students and one other student, [REDACTED] who attended a similar demonstration on 10/10/67, and their parents. The letter advised that the students were then on probation at the UP and any future involvement in activities opposed to the best interest of the UP could result in their dismissal from the UP.

On 11/2/67, it was reported that no student activity expressing opposition to the action taken by the UP concerning the above four students involved in ROTC protest demonstrations on 10/5 and 10/67, was taken. It was also reported that copies of above-mentioned letter had been mailed to these students and their parents by Dean MC GIBBENY.

On 11/15/67, it was reported that no problems had resulted from the UP's disciplinary action concerning above students. In fact, it was reported that one of the students, [REDACTED] dissociated himself from the other demonstrators and no longer has a "beatnik" appearance as he was then clean-shaven and well-dressed. Since 10/5/67, [REDACTED] former companions, [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], were reported to have participated in peaceful demonstrations opposing ROTC sponsored by the Students for Peace (SFP), a campus-approved student organization at the UP, which is characterized as an attachment hereto.

On 11/14 and 15/67, the SFP sponsored picketing demonstrations in front of the Student Union Building, UP, protesting recruiting of potential employees by representatives of the Dow Chemical Company. The demonstrators denounced Dow Chemical Company for production of napalm bombs and use of those bombs in Vietnam. Demonstrators, which numbered approximately 125 at the height of picketing, carried placards, distributed literature and held speeches. These demonstrations were peaceful and without incident. No efforts were made by demonstrators to enter the building or in any way interfere with interviews being conducted by Dow Chemical Company representatives or block entrance to the Student Union Building, where the interviews were being conducted in the Placement Services Office located on the second floor.

On 11/13/67, it was reported that the SFP planned no acts of violence or civil disobedience in connection with aforementioned demonstrations. The probability of such acts was minimized as the UP had announced that such acts by students would be in violation of the UP's rules and regulations and that violators faced arrest and possible expulsion from the UP.

The 11/16/67, issue of "The Pittsburgh Point", a weekly newspaper at Pittsburgh, contained an article entitled, "Napalm and Free Speech at Pitt," by RICHARD RIEKER, set forth that the 11/13/67, issue of "The Pitt News," a student newspaper at the UP, carried a letter written by JACK B. CRITCHFIELD, Dean of Students, UP, relative to the issue of representatives of the Dow Chemical Company appearing at the campus to recruit potential employees. The letter, described as a policy statement, was a reply to letter from six members of SFP protesting appearance of Dow Chemical Company recruiters on the UP campus. CRITCHFIELD was reported to have stated in his letter, "While those who are opposed to the activities of a particular employer have a right to make their views known to their fellow students by peaceful means, disorderly conduct or physical obstruction which interferes with any student's right to participate in an interview cannot be tolerated."

The article continued in part:

"The implications of the phrase 'cannot be tolerated' were spelled out by CRITCHFIELD in a meeting with some of the students about a week before the demonstration. CRITCHFIELD said, in an interview, that he had read to the students his own revision of a passage from the students' handbook. One part of the statement reaffirmed the right to protest. The last sentence read as follows: 'Any student involved in an on-campus protest whose nature is physical force or physical obstruction will be subject to dismissal from the University.'"

Among the principal speakers at above demonstration on 11/14/67, were ARTHUR TUDEN, Associate Professor of Anthropology, UP, who criticized the indiscriminate use of napalm against villages in Vietnam, causing death

and injury to civilians. JAMES HOLLAND, Psychology Professor, UP, reportedly participated in this demonstration on 11/14/68. Both of these professors have been active in anti-Vietnam war activities at Pittsburgh. HOLLAND is presently serving as Co-Director of the Peace and Freedom Center, a characterization of which is attached hereto.

APPENDIXSTUDENTS FOR PEACE (SFP)

The April 5, 1965, issue of "The Pitt News," a student newspaper at the University of Pittsburgh (UP), Pittsburgh, Pa., contained an article announcing the formation of a new student organization called "Students for Peace" (SFP). The article described SFP as a pacifist group, acting as an information center, which hoped to emphasize the importance of "seeking non-violent solutions into both international and domestic crimes." The article further stated that the organization grew out of the desire of several University pacifists to present students normally opposed to war with an alternative to "ROTC now or draft later."

On September 21, 1966, a source advised that at the first meeting of SFP during the 1966-67 school year on September 13, 1966, Bill Weber, SFP president, stated that SFP is not a pacifist group and anyone who expected it to be so could leave the meeting. Weber said the past president was a pacifist, but he would lead the organization as a militant group. He stated that it was not the purpose of the SFP to do only what the University allows, but since SFP was the only radical group on campus, they intended to do whatever they felt necessary to express the radical viewpoint.

On February 23, 1968, source advised that efforts by the Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP) to infiltrate, dominate, control or influence policies of SFP have, for the most part, been unsuccessful to date. Source advised, however, the CPWP has been interested in SFP since its beginning and has made efforts to recruit members of SFP into the Communist Party Youth Club (CPYC) and succeeded in recruiting one, Daniel Smullyan, who became a member of the Executive Board of the CPYC as the Club treasurer. He transferred to New York City after withdrawing from the UP in early 1966. One other SFP member, Richard Sayre, is currently a member of the Pittsburgh Chapter of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America (PDC).

APPENDIX

PEACE AND FREEDOM CENTER (PFC)

On May 1 and 10, 1968, a source advised that the PFC was located at 5899 Ellsworth Avenue, Pittsburgh, Pa. 15232. Prior to November, 1967, the PFC was known as the Pittsburgh Committee to End the War in Vietnam which had been activated in the Summer, 1965.

The PFC functions as a service organization and its aim is to coordinate Pittsburgh peace activities directed toward ending the war in Vietnam or other disturbances elsewhere. Activities also include those having racial overtures, the PFC advocating racial equality.

One member of the District Committee, Communist Party of Western Pennsylvania (CPWP) was on the Steering Committee of the PFC as of May 10, 1968. In addition, the CPWP exerts influence upon the activities of the PFC through the association of four other members of the CPWP, with Walter Tillow, Field Secretary, who is responsible for the physical operation of the PFC. Tillow, who was a speaker at a CPWP meeting in Pittsburgh on May 3, 1968, stated that a Marxist daily newspaper was vital to the needs of the public and agreed with communist policies on peace activities.

A review of Pittsburgh files discloses the following organizations that may have potential for counterintelligence action:

Pittsburgh Peace and Freedom Center (PPFC)
5899 Ellsworth Avenue
Pittsburgh, Pa.

This organization is operated by [redacted] with the assistance of his wife, [redacted] to coordinate peace activities and movements having racial overtures. The [redacted] are closely associated with members of the Communist Party (CP) and sympathize with the aims of the CP in Western Pennsylvania (CPWP).

Students For Peace (SFP)
University of Pittsburgh
Pittsburgh, Pa.

This is a campus-approved organization of the University of Pittsburgh. It refused to become affiliated with Students For a Democratic Society (SDS) but goes along with policies of SDS and peace demonstrations in Pittsburgh. There is one member of the W.E.B. DuBois Clubs of America in the organization.

Pittsburgh Veterans For Peace (PVP)

This organization is commanded by [REDACTED] a graduate of the United States Naval Academy and a graduate student at Carnegie-Mellon Institution, Pittsburgh. The Treasurer of PVP is [REDACTED], a member of the CPWP. There are about 90 members who so far have peacefully advocated the end of the war in Vietnam. [REDACTED] has been able to induce [REDACTED] to subscribe to "The Worker" and consider the CP line in his activities.

High School Students for Peace in Vietnam

This organization was organized by adults interested in the termination of the war in Vietnam. The students hold approximately weekly demonstrations and some have elected to take part in other peace demonstrations.

SDS, University of West Virginia,
Morgantown, W. Va.

In 1967, a chapter of SDS was organized at the University of West Virginia but to date it is not known to have been recognized by the National Headquarters, SDS. Activities have been negligible and normal activities have presently ceased at the University except for summer-school classes.

The Resistance

This organization operates out of the office of PPFC. Its purpose is to counsel and assist young men to resist the draft. Adult

supporters are [REDACTED] and his wife [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] and others.

Peace and Freedom Ticket (PPFT)

This political party was organized for the purpose of placing a third party on the November, 1968, Pennsylvania ballot. The CP was active in promoting this organization which resulted in DICK GREGORY and Dr. BENJAMIN SPOCK being nominated for President and Vice President of the United States. The organization has ceased to function temporarily pending the election.

The PPFC appears to be the center of new left activity in the Pittsburgh area. [REDACTED] works full time to promote activity of this nature and has a printing press in the PPFC office to assist in advertising demonstrations. It is believed that to curtail or eliminate the use of this equipment could be brought about by several methods.

Campus-approved organizations sometimes are allocated funds by the University. It is believed that if it could be shown that funds are utilized for producing un-American literature or activities, the funds may be denied. It is also believed that should the University demand that the student organization pay for guards when they wish to promote a demonstration on the campus, this would deter the organization from making the demonstration.

Plans utilizing the above suggestion will be formulated and the Bureau will be provided with details of counterintelligence proposals.
